Sitting in Chambers

Mr Crisp (of Simmons Crisp and Birrell) appeared for the Trustee Mr W. J. Batchelor and Mr Alport for the bankrupt and his wife Emma Lynch

Mr Crisp said the proceedings were taken under section 89 of the Bankruptcy Act and was in reference to the discovery of property that might be concealed by the bankrupt.

Emma Lynch was then called and sworn and was examined by Mr Crisp - :

I am the wife of Charles Robert Lynch

You were married I believe on April 5th 1894 ? - Yes

At that time you were house-maid at Clark's Hotel Geehan I believe ? - Yes; but not when

I was married but shortly before
His Honour How long before? — About a
 fortnight

M Crisp - What was your husband doing
 at this time? — He was carting at Mount
 Ida

His Honour Was he employed at the Mount
 Ida Company's works? — No he was
 carting for himself as a general
 carrier

His Honour He was in business as a car-
 ter then? — Yes

M Crisp What property did you
 possess at that time? — I had nothing
 at that time

Did you have nothing of your own?
 — No I had nothing

After you were married you went
 to Gormanston? — Yes

His Honour With your husband or by
 yourself? — With my husband
M Crisp. You knew his brother Edward
 Lynch of Baratoh? — Yes

Did Mr Edward Lynch start from
 husband as a carpenter at Gorman-
 ston? I don't know

M Crisp Well there is nothing turns
 on that so it does not matter. In 1894
 you went to Gormanston. How long was
 your husband carrying on the business
 of a carrier there? — I cannot tell
 you - for a long time

In 1896 your husband purchased
 three allotments of land at Gorman-
 ston

on which Lynch's Hotel was built? That would be the year we went into business as hotel keepers at Gormanston

And purchased three lots of lands there did he not on which the hotel was built? — Yes, we had the hotel on a residence license

M Alport And then it was turned into a fee simple

Mr. Cusack I think the hotel was partly built when we bought the land

M Crisp At this time did you hold any land of your own? — Yes I held a small portion at Gormanston

Mr. Horan Was that on a residence license or from a holding? — It was my own at Gormanston

Mr. Cusack It was from purchase from Mr. Cannon was it not? — Yes

Do you know how much you gave for it? — I am not quite sure but I think about £12

or £25? — It may have been the survey record at the office says £25. Is that right? I cannot tell you

But if the record says £25 you think that would be right? — Yes

There is a battery on this land now is there not? — Yes

Now where did you get the money to buy this land? — I can hardly tell you now where I got it. I had a little of my own and while we were carrying on the business I saved a little

But how did you save it? I did save it.
I had a little of my own when I was married - I think I had about £ 30

His Honour You said you had no property
but no I had no property but I had
about £ 30 in money

And you saved money afterwards. Out
of what? - I ought to have a little out
of the household expenses

How much did you have allowed for
these expenses? - I cannot say my hus-
band did not give me a fixed allow-
ance but he gave me so much for
the house

Mr Crisp There is a regular bakery on
this allotment. When was it put up?
I cannot tell you

Was it before you went into business as
an hotel keeper or afterwards? -
I think it was before

His Honour Did you erect this bakery? -
Yes Sir, I built it

How much did it cost? - I don't know
Did you have a carpenter to build
it? - Yes

What did you pay him? - I cannot say
How much was the timber? - I cannot say
I bought the timber on time -
payment as far as I can say

Did you look after the business yourself
or did your husband look after it? - He
did it through me

What do you mean by that? - He conducted
the business through me

He really made the bargains about the house and looks after it (The witness has stated) Is that so? - don't say yes because I say it? - well I suppose that is it
He made the bargains and looked after the house? - Yes

Mrs Cusack And where did you get the money to pay for it? - I think there is some not paid for yet

But such part as you did pay for? - well I got the money from the rent and the other from the business of my husband

Then what did it cost? - I cannot tell you the amount

You say you let your husband use the rent of the place? - I drew the rents and paid them to my husband

What I want to get at is how did you get the money to pay for this erection

His Honour can you tell me how much it cost? I cannot say

In Report I would like to point out your honour that the fire which took place at the hotel had a very bad effect upon her; so much so that she has not got her recollection back properly

His Honour what fire was this?

In Report At the Gormanston hotel sometime afterwards

Mrs Cusack well we will go to the hotel now. Your husband carried on the business at Lynnells hotel? - It was

I called at the Criterion at Gormanston
on July 11 1898 the hotel was turned down
was it not? — Yes

Do you know whether the property was un-
insured? — not by ourselves

But it was insured by the Cascade Brewery
Company now what was saved from
that fire? — I don't think there was any-
thing saved

What nothing? — nothing at all —
The buildings were not totally destroyed?
The hotel was totally destroyed — nothing
was left at all only a chimney standing
well now what about the cash — was
any cash destroyed? All that was in
the house

You were doing a very good business at
the time there? — he had been doing
very well, but not so well just at that time
He did you personally save any money
from the fire? — no

To cheques or notes? — No

I am instructed that at the time of
the fire enquiry you were very
much overcome and fainted? — Yes

Do you know a woman named
McKensie of Kelly Basin who was at
that time — or had been — a cook at your
hotel? — Yes she is now living at
Kelly Basin

When you fainted she attended to
you? — Yes

She says that she had to undo your
dress and that when she did so she

saw a large quantity of notes and cheques
 2 - Mr Frank Gaffney gave me that just ^{before}
 before the fire enquiry

I understand it was a present from the
 business people. How much was there and
 of what did it consist? — I cannot tell
 you now what notes or gold or cheques
 there were. I cannot even tell you the
 total amount, but it was over £. 50

As above was this the same money
 as the enquiry? — Yes Sir the same
 morning

In Cash was that given to you personally
 or by your husband? — No, to me per-
 sonally by Mr Gaffney

Do you know the amount of the insurance
 money — was it £ 950? — I am not
 sure. There was insurance for the
 Cascade Brewery and for Mr Bar-
 gess I think but I am not sure

After the fire your husband carried
 on the business on the site of the hotel
 for some months? — Yes

Was it not in a little place that had
 not been burned down? — Yes it was
 in a cottage I suppose you would call
 it — it was on the next block and was
 not a part of the same building

Do you know whether your husband
 sold the building subsequently to Clark?
 — I don't know much about the
 business of that allotment

Do you know that Clark purchased
 it subsequently? — I believe he did.

but dont know much about their business

How long was your husband carrying on business on this site before he sold it to Clark. He sold everything to Clark did he not. How long was he carrying on the business? — Until his license expired — about three months I think.

In Crisp (to his mom) He sold under a permit (of witness) At the same time there was a sale ~~and~~ of Rehorses and teams and carts was there not? — I cannot say. I don't know if he had any that I can tell you about. He has one horse now and that is all I remember.

Is that the chestnut horse? — Yes

After the sale to Clark you went to Kelly's Basin with your husband? — Yes As that time what property had you? — We had the property at Gormanston, the bakehouse and I had one block of land at Pillinges.

How much did you pay for it — £660?

— No I did not. I think it was a hundred and some pounds.

How much did you give for it now? — I can't remember. I bought it on a 14 years payment.

His property under the pasture lands act? — Yes sir

How many acres were there? — I think about a quarter of an acre

You don't remember the price? — Some thing over £100 It was the deposit money — I don't remember how much

- it was bought at auction

Mr Crisp If the records show that the price
was £615.16.5 —

Witness That is a different lot

His Honour Then you bought two lots? — Yes

— They were at different ends of the town

Mr Crisp When you first went to Pittsfield
you purchased a piece of land at a
government sale — I am not too
ferring to where your hotel is — I am
not speaking of that block

Well you purchased a block — for how
much? — For over £100 but I cannot
tell you the exact amount — it was shortly
after we went to Kelly's Basin

In April 1899, about three months after
you went there you purchased I think an
other block at a government sale for
£600 odd? — Yes

His Honour Were they both bought
at auction? — Yes

What was the price of this last? —
Mr Crisp £666.13.4 — That is on the
records; and the records show that you
paid a deposit of £41.13.4 —
would that be correct? — Yes

Where did you get these money's
from? — The first money I had (put by)
before leaving Gormanton; then there
was £50 odd from Mr Gaffney
and also another £100 from Mrs
Gaffney

What was that for? — He let me
have £100 either as a gift or a ban-

to return it to him if I could - I also had £100 from my sister
Mr Crisp Mr Gaffey supplemented the subscription Mrs Lynch has told us of by £100 from his own pocket after the fire

Has Tomor (Policeman) You say you got £100 from your sister ? — Yes

Where is she ? — In Dornavon

What does she do ? — She is a married woman

What does her husband do ? — He was a manager at that time on the Mount Lyell mine

What is his name ? — Blackwell
Were they in business ? — No I think he has always been mining

What salary does he get ? — I think about 12/- or 13/- a day

You say he was employed on the Mount Lyell Company ? — He was then but is not now. He is still at Gor manston and I think employed on this company [?]

Mr Crisp You have since sold these lots to Mr Little of Devonport ? — Yes

What did you get for them ? — I got £275 and I sold it in two different lots

When did you sell it ? — I really can not tell you

Is it twelve months ago or a month or what ? — It is more than a month
In November 1891 would that be

eight for the last ¹¹ lot ? — Yes, perhaps
that would be right

Were besides those two lots at Kelly Basin
you have told us of you proceeded to —
erect a hotel on the Govt Reserve
at Pellerin ? — Yes

Did you have a residence license for
that particular block ? — Yes

You took out a residence license ? — Yes
And you took possession of this piece
of land on the reserve to build an
hotel upon ? — Yes

Did you know you were outside the
boundary and that the Govt could not
allow you to have that piece of land — in
fact that you "jumped" it ? — No,
I thought it was correct

You had to get an accy - parchment
to put it right — is not that so ? — I be-
lieve so

I see you built this hotel there — a very
large hotel of 25 rooms rooms I
believe ? — It has had additions made
to it

What did it cost you ~~to~~ to build
that hotel ? — I cannot tell you exactly
— about £400 or £450

His Honour You could not build a
hotel with 25 rooms for £450
truth There were only 13 rooms at
first

Mr Crisp What did the furniture cost you ?
I got it on the time payment system
, I could not tell you what it cost.

It was not furnished very well in the first place

As Amours When was your husband declared bankrupt?

M Crisp Just about Christmas - he was adjudicated bankrupt on the 20th December
As Amours (to witness) what was your husband doing at that time? - He did not do anything

He had nothing to do - Nothing, but he had to hold the license for me

Did he not help about the hotel - did he not serve in the bar? - No he did not serve in the bar

What did he do then - just to af about? - He did not work here - I cannot tell you what he did

It appears then that you kept him in - dead of his keeping you? - That was luck I suppose; he could not do anything else than what he did

M Crisp How did you get the stock and furniture at Pillinger's? - I bought it from E J Miller to pay for when I could

As Amours Where is he? - At Zeehan
M Crisp And when did you build these additional 12 rooms to the hotel ~~for~~ Mrs Lynch? - I think they have been built - about 15 months

What did they cost? - I can't tell you the amount

Did they cost one hundred or two hundred pounds? - I could not say - They cost a good bit

13

I suppose you did a big business? — no
not a very big business — I have not all
the timber paid for yet
where did you get the money from for
the timber? — I got the timber from
Risby Bros

Have you paid for it? — we all
had the furniture? — I got that from
Mr E J Miller; but there is a balance
due

How much did the furniture cost? — I
think about £215 was the actual furnish-
ing amount

Well now what was your husband doing
from 1899 right down to the present
time? Helping you in that hotel? — He
has been just in the hotel and that is all. He
has been doing nothing in the way of
business

His Name Has the license been in his name
? — Yes

Then he has been carrying on the business
Mr Crisp what profits did you make at
Kelly's Basin? — Very little

Well you know you put up a house of
24 rooms — you would not do that
unless you were doing a good business?

It took all the profits to keep the place
going

And you borrowed money? — Yes I
borrowed from the brewers and several
others

Last year — in June 1900 Charles
Lynch transferred this hotel to you an

Act of Parliament having been passed in the meantime giving power to Charles Lynch & tell it? — It was a mistake — it should have been nine — he had no money to put into it

Well in June 1900 he transferred the land to you and you accepted it for he consider a sum of £11. Now you gave a mortgage over the land of £300 to Jane Eileen Beddoe at Pilkington? — Yes what did you do with that £300? — It was the purchase money to pay the Govt for the land

And you have since given a mortgage on the land to [] Dugos? — Brothers? — I signed a mortgag when for it from brother in law Mr Edward Lynch obtained a judgment against your husband and issued execution? — Yes

And the bailiff was put in when you gave notice of claim against all the things as your property and amongst other things there was a Chestnut horse. How did you get that horse? — I did not give them any instructions about the horse. I told them it was not mine. It is a mistake

What about the cow? does that belong to you? — Yes that belongs to me

And all that furniture? — Yes you claim all that? — Yes

And the stock? — Yes

Now your husband besides keeping you with the hole at Pilkington has been

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pine cutting for you & no, I had a man
cutting for me but not my husband
His Honour What possessed you to go
into the pine cutting trade? — anything
to make money

Mr Cross Did at your husband get a
man named Maxwell to cut logs? — Not
that I know of

He cut nothing for you? — No

Then you claim these pines as your
own property? — Yes, I was in
partners with Maxwell but I paid
another man so much weekly
How much did they cut? — I can't say

How did you get the money to pay for
his work? — Out of the profits of
the hotel

Can you give us some idea of the profits
I — No

Were you making a thousand a year? — No
That is not an unreasonable amount
I — I could not really speak as to the
amount

His Honour How much did you take a
week? — I cannot tell you; I never
went into it in that way

When was pay night? — About every
three weeks

Mr Cross What would you consider a good
night's takings? — In the best nights I should
think £13 or £14

His Honour Thought it would be more
than that

Mr Cross You would not take half that now

M^r Crisp Mr Edward Lynch who made your husband bankrupt says the bankrupt is possessed of teams of horses carts and considerable effects. Is that correct? — I don't remember his having any

His Honour Is the bankrupt here?

M^r Report He has not been summoned but he is in town and will be very willing to come up and give evidence

M^r Report Then explained about the transfer of the land and the Act of Parliament which had brought it about. He then proceeded to cross examine Mrs Lynch.

At the inquest on the fire were you very unwell? — Yes

Have you ever thoroughly recovered from the shock you received on the occasion of that fire? — No

His Honour She carries on the business however

M^r Report She has her husband's assistance of course in the management of the hotel. As to the land do you know whether the land is fully or partly paid for? Has it a mortgage on it? — Yes? — I think it is fully paid for

Has it a mortgage on it? — Yes by the Cascades Brewery Company

Do you know how much it is let for — per rent of it? — For 35/- for one part of the week

The Cascade Brewery Company have

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a mortgage over it? — Yes

How long have they had it, do you know? —
They have had it since I started at the Basin
— when I first started I borrowed money
from them

You told Mr Crisp the bakery was erected
in 1896 I think? — Yes

That was sometime before the fire? —
Yes, two years

And how was your husband getting on then?
— That was when he was in the hotel in
Gormanston

Was he doing pretty well? — Yes

Was he solvent? — Yes

He owed nothing? — nothing that
I am aware of

Nothing that he could not pay? — No
You told his honour you had £30 when
you were married to the bankrupt

? — Yes as near as I can recollect
was that the money that you bought the
original block of land with at Gor-
manston? — Yes it was my own money
which bought that block

Then when you built that bake-
house did you borrow the money
for the building? — I think I got the
timbers on credit

And how did you pay for that timber
afterwards? — I can't remember but
I know I owe money now on the bakehouse

Did you use the rent of the bakehouse
to reduce the debt on it? — My hus-
band made use of the rent as a rule

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and I have never had it back - it was to help him

Now at the inquest about this money that has been spoken of as being given by Mrs McKenzie about your dores. I understand that you held it in trust? — Yes

It was what was given you by Mr Jaffrey and had been collected by public subscriptions? — Yes

Why was the subscription got up? — I cannot tell you - but I suppose because everything of ours was destroyed by the fire

Was your husband penniless? — Yes
I believe he had had a little money in the bank? — Yes

were all your clothes burned? — Yes
And do you know of your own knowledge what your husband had? There were a few pounds in the bank in his name I believe? — Yes but there was an outstanding Cheque which had not been presented and when it was presented I took all the money.

And with the money you had he bought clothing for you as I understand all your clothing had been burned? — Yes

And with this exception your husband had nothing? — nothing with my knowledge

Well then you went to Kelly's Basin in 1899? — Yes
at the beginning of the year? — Yes

When you went ¹⁹ there had you any property there ? — Yes I had the block of land mentioned

And had you had bought on the credit system ? — Yes

When you bought that you had certain moneys ? — Yes

You have told us that beyond the moneys raised by subscription, what Mr Jeffery gave or lent you and what your sister gave or lent you that you had nothing ? — No I do not think I had anything

That is when you bought block 2 — Yes

Then you began to build ? — Yes

Where did you get the money from ? You have told us you borrowed some from the brewery ^{between} ~~and some~~ from Mr Watchorn

Did you mention that before ?

Mr Cusick How much did you borrow from Mr Watchorn ? — I think about £130

Was not that stopped ? — Yes

Mr Alport The fact is I think that Mr Watchorn drew back after the ban was partly completed (by witness) Is that so ? — Yes

But there was a ban from him ? Yes

And from Mac Gregor Bros and the Leascade Brewery ? — Yes

Were there any other moneys that you borrowed ? — No I don't think so who is it that is taking these proceedings

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against your husband & his brother
anyone else? — not that I know of.

His Honour How much is owing him
I — £ 100

And how much to Burgers Brothers?
Mr. Crisp: £ 400

In Report When you started business at
Pelly Basin in whose name was the business
carried on? — In my own name and
every body recognised me as the owner
of the business

His Honour In whose name was the
licensee? — My husband.

In Report Since you started who has
paid all the bills? — I have paid all
the bills

In whose name has all the stock been
purchased? — In my name

Have you dealt with Messrs Burgers —
Brothers? — Yes

Have you received bills from them? — Yes
Ever since you have been at Peller
— the whole time this hotel has been
running? — Yes

Have you paid these bills? — Yes
Roughly speaking how much do
you think those bills would amount
to? — I should think close on £ 700
or £ 800 and perhaps more

Do you owe them anything now? — No

Have you dealt with Messrs Watchorn
? — Yes

And received bills from them and
paid them? — Yes

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You know that Mr W J Wallerham is trustee to your husband's ^{bankrupt} estate? — Yes
His firm has been dealing with you ever since you went to Kelly's Basin I think?
2 — Yes

And has Mr Wallerham ever said anything about this hotel belonging to your husband? — He has said nothing to me on the subject

on the contrary has he not always supplied you with his goods sent you the bills and received the money from you

2 — Yes

And others have treated you in the same way and sent their bills in to you in the same way? — Yes

In whose name is the bank account? — In my own name

You have drawn on the takings? — Yes

And paid the accounts? — Yes

No amount You have always drawn the cheques? — Yes

No report And it is now nearly four years since the fire took place and you have been in business three years and the people who have received your money have said nothing until today? — No

Has it been notorious in the district that every thing was yours? — Yes

And that has known to everybody

2 — Yes to everybody
At the inquest on the fire Mr Gaffney gave you fifty

pounds? — Yes something over that
he subsequently gave you £100? — Yes
You got a further sum of £100 from
your sister? — Yes

What other money did you have when
you went to Killarney? — I had some
money in the Gormandson Bank I think

Did the Cascade Brewery lend you any
money on the bakery at that time? — Yes

How much? — £100 I think

And with these moneys you purchased
these two pieces of land and built an
hotel? — Yes, and I got a sum of
money from Waterford

And the expense of the 15 additional
rooms you put up in the hotel you
found one of the profits of your
business? — Yes

Mrs. Brown If she got this money
in the way she says she did and these
statements are absolutely true and
correct it is a possible explanation

In Report Mrs. Lynch has had no
opportunity of seeing Mr. Gaffney
on the subject, but he is quite pre-
pared to come forward and ~~and~~
give evidence and we can get other
witnesses to corroborate Mrs. Lynch.
The poverty of this unfortunate
husband has been shown by the
evidence given to day.

In Cork I understand that Mrs.
Lynch is in town and I think it
would be satisfactory if he were

here

Mrs Lynch He did not get any information to come

His Honour You are entitled to test the witness evidence

It was decided to adjourn the case until half past two o'clock that same afternoon

Afternoon Sitting

At the hour mentioned the bankrupt was in attendance

Mr Report read a declaration signed by the bankrupt to the effect that he was trustee for his wife in July 1900 being a document to which Mr Report had referred in the morning

Charles Robert Lynch, bankrupt.

Examined by Mr Crisp

I am the husband of Mrs Crisp who was here this morning

I am instructed that you brother started you in business at Formanston as a carter - is that so? Well I had been working for him all my life. He did not know for some considerable time after now we stood till he sent me in a bill after I was married for £500. He supplied me with horses and carts

His Honour How many horses did he give you before you were married?

Four if I am not making a mistake four horses and two

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vehicles. Do speak from memory but I
would not be positive of course

M^r Crisp You got on pretty well I think as
a carter? — Yes very well

Then you went into the hotel at Gor-
manston? — Yes

His Honour It was at Gormanston you were
principally carting? — Yes

You did very well with the carting?
— Yes until the latter end

M^r Crisp Then you bought three lots of land
at Gormanston upon which the hotel
was put up? — Before that I might
tell you I lost nine horses in about
seven months which caused me to go
into the hotel business. I lost them from
disease and this brought things almost
down to a collapse

His Honour Did you buy these three allot-
ments or did your wife buy them? —
I bought them

How did you raise money to build the hotel?
— It was principally borrowed
from the Cascade Brewery Company
and from Davis & Crisp [?]

And you transferred the hotel to the
Brewery as security? — That was before
the money was borrowed

Now there was a bakery at Gorman-
ston that your wife had. How did she
get that? — That was bought some
years before — three years, or three and a
half as near as I can say

Now did we you buy it? — No she

Bought it - and it was £ 12.10. as near as I can say for the land

How did she get the money to build the bakery

2 - It was only a little place

But how did she get the money? — She had a considerable amount of money when we were married — she had been in service about $\frac{1}{3}$ years and had saved it

How much? — I could not say — £30 or £40 and the place only cost a little money in the first instance. The Liverpool Company advanced the material and she paid for the labour

— £?

You transferred the block on which the hotel is to the Brewery? — Yes

And on the 20th August following your wife transferred the bakery? — Yes

What was that transfer given by the wife for? — It was for borrowing money for me if I needed any right

What did you do with it? — It all went to the Gormans town property for debt incurred that had to be met. We kept no records of these things, but I am giving you all I can remember here

You remembered the fire? — I do so. The place was pretty well burned down? — All but the chimney

And the insurance money — What became of it? — The Cascade Brewery had it.

What was the amount? — Seven hundred and fifty - pound (£750) I believe

That's right. What did the Brewery do with theal money & — I could not say

This Honour Did you get any of it & —
no your honour

Mr Crisp How much did you owe to the
Brewery at that time? — The Brewery took
the lot — I know that

Mr Report There was £ 646. 9. 4 owing
to the Brewery and £ 14 3 to Crisp

Mr Crisp Then after the fire you still can
run on the business with a permit? — Yes
Then you sold on the site to Clark for
what did you do with that money? —
he never got a shilling of it — not
out of the whole thing Mr Burgess
got that

This Honour How much did you sell
the site for £ 7 — £ 350 through
Mr Burgess to Clark but we never saw
a shilling of it — they were forcing
me to take

Mr Crisp Don't you know that the Brewery
credited your account with the money? —
— That may be we lost everything in
the fire and had no records to show.

I want to get at how the money was
appropriated

Mr Report. It did not clear them Your
honour Mr Burgess paid the Brewery-
Company a cheque for £ 378. 9. 6
that was appropriated for money owing
for Coddells ale and beer and the
balance was paid to Mr Crisp on his
charge of his timber account.

Mr. Cushing what about the profits you made in your business? — I think the principal part of the profits was forced on a carriage. I went away to a different place but Mrs. Lynch unfortunately took in some boarders who did not pay and who left home by moonlight and that is — unfortunately I think where the profits came in — or rather went to my wife I am speaking after the fire? — That was after the fire.

Cannot you account for any profits in the business? — I cannot say — I was only there about three months. I was disgusted with the whole thing and I said to my wife "If there is anything to be got out of it take it yourself." The boarders cleaned away and left her to pay for everything.

At the time you went to Pellingen what about your horses and carts? — I took none. There was only one.

What did you do with the others? — There were three horses in the stable but they did not belong to me. At the time of the fire there were two carts. One of them was at farm another under a man named Hill a carrier? — Very little I should say — seven pounds. The other horse and cart were taken to Kelly's Barn and are still there.

What are they worth? — About five pounds I suppose.

His Answer Have you only one cart at

Pillingen now? - That is all you know. The cart which is at Pillingen has been bought since there was only one cart at the time of the fire and it is still there.

Mr Crisp Then you went to Kelly Basin and your wife purchased some land there. Where did you get the money from?

2 - Mrs Lynch had the money

Mrs Amour Where did she get it? - Well I know a certain amount she does now but I know she had £67 in the savings bank that has not been brought forward at all yet. She had that saved up for the children. It was the first money spent I think.

Mr Crisp: I suppose that would be money you had given to her? - No it was money whose people had given to the children or for the children. At the time of the fire it amounted to £67.

Mrs Amour How many children have you got? - Three now, and the eldest is about five years old - there was one older but he died.

Mr Crisp You remember seeing your brother at Zeehan? - Yes he asked you why you had put something in your wife's name? And I told him because my creditors would not meet me.

Did he say it was to block Burgers Brothers? - No; they were the only persons pushing, and the one thing they were after was Mrs Lynch's property.

and they could not possibly get that —
 Burgers Brothers said they would not advance
 me any money but would advance it
 to Mrs Lynch through my brother and
 the Cascade Brewery and Watchborn
 She has bought two or three properties
 — where did she get the money from ?
 — Out of the business. I might tell you that
 the first money was never paid. She
 had money from the Cascade and Burgers
 Brothers which was never paid

Has Anna Did she borrow money down
 there ? — Yes she borrowed money from
 Gaffney and from her sister
M Bush How much from her sister ? —
 £100 I believe

has had a loan or a gift ? — Well
 Gaffney and I have been children —
 together — I know she got £100 from
 him and about £60 were collected
 for her after the fire

What did she get from the sister ? —
 She told me nearly £100 but was
 not quite positive as to the amount
 but that could be ascertained of wiring
 to the sister

Well now what have you been doing
 since the fire ? — What could I do

I don't ask you what you could do,
 but what were you doing ? — I was
 living on the best way I could

What have you been doing ? — I offered
 them five shillings or one pound
 but they would not meet me

What have you been doing? — I have been holding
the license ³⁰

And helping in the hotel? — Yes, most of
the time

What part would you take in the conducting
of the hotel? — I was responsible for the
law I suppose as I held the license

What part did you take — did you look
after the bar? — Yes when the barman was
out I looked after the bar

Did you generally supervise things? — Yes
as much as any body else

And you built up the business? — Well,
yes, as well as anybody else

Did you have any salary? — I used
to ask Mrs Lynch when I wanted a pound
and she let me have it

Have you ever left the hotel for a lengthened
period? — I was in Hobart once or twice
Well have you paid any money for your
wife at all? — No I had no money to
pay at all — everybody knows how
we left the house

Was the subscription that was raised
after the fire for you? — No, it was handed
over to Mrs Lynch by Mr Gaffney
or Crisp. I think there are no other
questions I wish to ask the witness

Examined By True Report.

Who is making you bankrupt? — My
brother

What was he a creditor for? — Well
that is a very funny question to ask.
I never had a proper account from —

him and my opinion is that I am owing him nothing at all. He offered Blake £70 and then he sent me a bill bringing it up to £100 pretty cash and £30 odd for interest which there was never anything mentioned about. I tried to meet him in every way and Mrs Lynch was going to help him

His Answer Your brother's claim is £130? —

It is £160 odd Once he offered Blake £70 I had an interview with him soon after the fire and offered to give him bills and told him that the amount of £35 would be paid in three months and the bills afterwards. But Real offer was refused Ten days before the Court case at Burnie they said they would (not) give ^{bills} for £25 every three months till the full amount was paid which would mean £200

Mr Report Then did he snap judgment on you? — Yes

For one £160 odd? — Yes

And then he proceeded to make you bankrupt? — Yes

What do you owe Burgess Brothers? — I have no idea; they are claiming more than is owing

Do you owe Watchorn Brothers anything? — Yes £24

Did Burgess Bros. ever threaten you to late proceedings against you? — No

It was left for his unbroken brother to do that? — Yes

His Answer Was there any particular quarrel between you? — No

In Report Has he any Grievance against you? —
No.

How does he get on with you - is there anything between you? — Nothing of that he hates the wife that is what is causing all the trouble

It is a fact that Burges Brothers to whom was owing £400 never took any proceedings, and has done nothing against you up to the present time? — No

Mr Crisp You be careful! Did they not get judgment and issue execution against you? — It is news to me of they did - if they have got judgment it is indeed news to me

M Alport In any conversation between you have they ever threatened you with bank ruptcy? — No

Have they ever suggested that your money had been fraudulently put into your wife's name? — No no creature has ever done so except my brother

It was reserved for your brother to do this. Now, you remember when your wife built that bakery? — Yes in 1896; or '95 I think it was

Well now; at that time you were in the hotel at Gilmanston? — Yes

Well now, were you solvent at that time? — Yes before the fire

The main problem was that the place was not insured & its value so far as you were concerned. At that time I understand that you were more than solvent - before the fire I mean? — Yes

After the fire you carried on business in
the little hut or cottage close by? Yes
How many rooms were there in it? —
Your rooms

Then the whole profit I suppose would
be the profit on the sale of the liquor
? — She had four or six boarders

Was there much opportunity to make profit
at that period? — No there was no opportu-
nity. Everything was done — the fire had des-
troyed the opportunity

After the fire had you anything at all
— what had you? — The morning after
the fire I drew £ 111 out of the Nation
Bank at Gormanston. That was all we
had.

What did you do with that? — There
was £ 15 I had to pay for a carriage
Then there were others left by the fire
like ourselves without clothes. The
purchase of clothes for ourselves amounted
to £ 14, and the rest I had left I gave
to Mr. Lynch to get some things to keep
the house going till it was open again.
That was the only money I had — it was
the next morning after the fire — it was
everything I had

There were several people in the hotel
? — Yes, the place was full

Several were nearly burned to death
I believe? —

Yes — indeed there were six burned
to death. I was burned and my brother
was burned. I got burned going
back for my brother

This brother? — Oh not — not this brother I first got out Mrs Lynch and the boy and then went back and got my legs and arms and my hair burned

And every body's clothes were burned?

— Yes

Everything? — They just escaped in what they had on?

Did you have, after that fire, anything whatever? — No.

That is absolutely true? — Except this chestnut horse

And the old cart? — Yes

The horse is 2½ years old I believe? — Yes

Is that everything? — It is everything in the world

Now of course the suggestion is that your money has started Mrs Lynch Is that true or false? — It is not true — all she got was the few pounds I have told you about

And that was to keep you going? — Yes, for the household expenses

Then what property have you now? — I have no property at all

Nothing? — No

Do you remember that conversation with your brother when you said you did not tell your brother you would put everything in your wife's name in order to block Burgess Brothers? — No

Did such a conversation take place?

? — I can't remember the conversation at all

In Court Before you get the license of

of the hotel at Pillinges

In Report on the conversation with your brother at Zeehan ? — I saw him every time I was there

How long is it since you had a conversation with him ? — At the end of July last at Waratah - he was quite friendly and led me on to believe they were going to settle it.

But this conversation which he alleges took place more than three years ago you don't remember ? — No I do not know what money your wife has borrowed ? — Near about

Of course you don't carry it in your head ? — No . Ever since that hotel at Kelly Basin has been erected the bills have been made out in the name of Mrs Kelly Lynch . The goods have been supplied there and they have looked there for payment and it is notorious throughout the district that the property was her Burgess and Walchorn and the Cascades Company always rendered their accounts to Mrs Lynch and were paid by her

In Cash You have told us that you gave your wife £60 odd after the fire ? — So I said that was the balance . It might have been £40 or £50 — it might only have been £20

What was done with that money ? — It was used for furnishing and house keeping and everything that we had to get for after the fire we had nothing whatever left

His Honour was there not any of the £111 left when you went into the cottage? — No, not ~~not~~ a penny of it for there had been fine weeks to keep us and provide things. There were seven of them left destitute besides the wife and children.

In Report I think the witness has accounted for the balance of it.

M Crisp You carried on the business here for three or four months — There was furniture there? — Yes.

This bill of Burgess Brothers — was it for liquor while you were selling under this permit? — I think there were others supplied us.

You mean to say there was no profit at all while you carried on the business under the permit? — I don't think there was. It was only there a few days. I was away for a time at Gordons River and Relly's Basin.

When you went to the Pillingers what became of this furniture you have told us of? — There was only some stretchers. He took the things away to Strahan and Mrs Field I think got the balance of what we did not take with us. What were you doing up the Gordon River — did you cut any pines there? — No.

None whatever? — No. This closed the evidence.

M Report and Mr. Crisp addressed the Court.

His Honour said he thought the money which Mrs Lynch had in the bank; that which she obtained from the Cascade Brewery from Balchorn, from Gaffney and from her sister - see those sums would sufficiently account for all the woman had done. The only money which might perhaps be said to have been misappropriated was that sum of £111 which Lynch had drawn out of the bank after the fire. The law would of course allow him to provide for clothes and other necessaries after the fire - but there might have been a balance - that was all he (the learned judge) could say.

Mr Alport said Lynch had accounted for more than half.

His Honour said there was a part which was not accounted for.

Mr Crisp said Mrs Lynch might very fairly pay something of that £111.

His Honour thought some of that was the creditors' money - the difficulty was to say how much.

Mr Alport - Yes it is difficult to say what amount should be agreed upon.

His Honour said the question of costs should at all events be considered. It was rather rough on the creditors.

Mr Alport thought that Mrs Lynch would pay these costs. Every body appeared to have been satisfied but it was reserved for his unbrotherly brother to take these proceedings.

Mrs Lynch had nothing beyond what she had to pay their own creditors

In Cross said the property is worth £1500

As among I don't say how much should be paid but I think in Report you should find about half the sum men-
tioned

In Report. I will see about it

After some further argument the legal gentlemen agreed to come to some understanding if possible and the parties left the Court His Honour preferring not to make any order

The proceedings then closed.
