National Family History Month

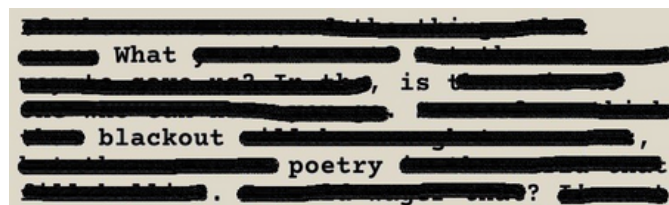
Delve into your past with free National Family History Month events!
